



Boss urges resident backing for plans

GLOVERS' boss Terry Skiverton has urged the town of Yeovil to back the football club's plans to develop retail units and new stand at Huish Park. Chairman John Fry this week revealed plans to regenerate training pitches as well as replace the Copse Road end terrace with a 3,500 all-seater stand with community facilities.

ities. Skiverton said the town's residents would be integral to ensuring the club continues progress made since he joined the club 11 years ago and became boss in 2009. "From my side and the footballing side this club is really taking off and it is at a time where finances have been tight and clubs have been folding," he said

"With everything that is going on behind the scenes we need this development to go through – me on the playing side definitely does. We want to progress.

"We have got to this stage where we are under the chair.

"We have got to this stage where we are under the chairman and the current board and we want to see if we can go further."

"What we cannot do is have supporters coming to the game and not enjoying themselves.

"The supporters cannot complain and say they have not been heard because it has taken this time to now move on and give the supporters what they want so they can be there on the terraces supporting their team, having a good match day experience.
"I am excited to be part of it and to be the manager now that The supporters cannot com-

to the town of Yeovil. We want to see if we can kick on. We might need that little bit back from local people to say 'yes, let's see Yeovil Town progress and to get them where they want to be'."
