

# Wright's 15-Yard Shot Put

## Yeovil Ahead But—

GUILDFORD City, who were playing amateur international Mills at right half, were quickly on the attack. Yeovil's goalkeeper, Dyke, scrambled Jackson's shot away in the first minute and Bennett went just wide with a shot on the run.

Yeovil broke away and Wright put Phillips through, but the centre forward, racing away on his own, could only shoot outside the post.

WRIGHT, who took the honours as Yeovil's best forward, put his side in the lead after 22 minutes with a shot from 15 yards out. Almost immediately Gleeson missed a golden chance of equalising, shooting over the bar from five yards out.

Guildford fought back hard but their attack lacked method. Their best scoring effort was a header by centre-forward Jackson, from Howard's corner which went just outside the post.

Two minutes before the interval Guildford equalised when BENNETT snapped up a pass and shot into the right hand corner of the net.

Phillips, Yeovil's leader, was a tenacious trier and his duels with Guildford's centre-half, Sadler, were a feature of the first-half play. Wright was the main-spring of Yeovil's attack. Half-time: Guildford 1, Yeovil 1.

# Yeovil Lost First-Half Sparkle—Drew

YEOVIL were soon on the defensive in their away Southern League match with Guildford City, and Dyke snaffled away a shot by Jackson.

Bennett went inches wide with a shot on the run. Yeovil, fighting back, with Wright playing a great game, forced the pace and had the Guildford defence in a tangle. Phillips was robbed in front of goal, and Clack made a fine save from a long shot by Wright.

# DIRECT METHODS UPSET YEOVIL

## Weymouth Deserved Their Point; Changes In Reserves To-night

WEYMOUTH surprised even their most ardent supporters by taking a Southern League point from Yeovil last evening, and they fully deserved it. Largely unproductive of the finer points, the game was nevertheless full of thrills, after the fashion of local Derby clashes, and the large crowd—9,054 paid £513—saw 90 minutes of "cup-tie" soccer with never a let-up from either side.

After mediocre opening play Yeovil took command but were met by a fine defence in Marsden and Gavin.

Weymouth then came into the picture and after Dyke had made a brilliant save from McCowan, Haynes, following up, crashed the ball into the net. Inspired by this unexpected success Weymouth, marshalled by their manager Gallacher swarmed to the attack and it was some minutes before Yeovil could fight them off.

### Gallacher, Schemer

Dyke saved a certain goal when he took the ball from the foot of Johnson almost on the goal-line, but Yeovil were not to be denied and before the interval Wright equalised following the award of an indirect free-kick close in.

Gallacher was the schemer in the Weymouth attack and several times he split the home defence wide open in the second half, but Yeovil took the lead through Bryant—who had been well held by Brawley—with a header from a perfectly-placed corner-kick by Hamilton.

Both teams forsook football for hefty kicking and there were some hard knocks. The home defence cracked to allow Haynes to equalise.

### Strong Defence

Yeovil lost this point because they allowed first-time methods to upset their football, and when they attempted to play the same way the Weymouth defence was too strong. But the excitement lasted until the final whistle.

# WEST-COUNTRY SPORT

Yeovil Town's visit to Guildford resulted in one of the brightest games seen there for many weeks, Guildford, who have been badly off form of late, fielded a greatly re-arranged team and made Yeovil fight all the way for their 3-0 victory.

ALTHOUGH, after a scrappy opening, both forward lines showed clever and intelligent football, it was the defences which held the upper hand throughout the game.

Les Blizzard and his men were often hard pressed by the lively home attack, but stood the strain well and displayed some prodigious kicking.

Dyke, in goal, played a fine game, and received excellent support from his full-backs.

Outstanding in a Yeovil forward line which was always alert to its chances, were the left-wing pair, Roy and Wright. Bryant was an astute leader, but was well held by Sadler, the Guildford centre-half. Keeton was the best of the half-backs.

His goal with which Yeovil opened their tally, was a fine piece of work, coming as it did from 45 yards range. At half time, Yeovil were leading 1-0.

Coffey (76min.) and Hamilton (85min.), were the other scorers.
