# TOWN FETES CUP GIANT-KILLERS

**T**EN minutes from the end of extra time Eric Bryant, Yeovil's 26-year-old centre-forward, a part-time professional who works at a local corn store, made history for his club.

He scored the winning goal to give Yeovil, the only non-League club left in the competition, a 2-1 victory over First Division Sunderland in the F.A. Cup. For the little Somerset team it meant a three-fold record—highest-ever attendance of 17,100, highest takings at over £2,000, and their farthest-ever stride on the road to football fame.

Yeovil had equalled the record of last season's sensation-makers, Colchester Town, who then became the first non-League side to reach the fifth round.

### Their Two Idols

The Somerset side's supporters had two other idols last night—29-year-old Alec Stock, the player-manager, who gave up a bank career to become the youngest man in Britain to manage a professional football club, and 23-year-old Dick Dyke, amateur reserve goalkeeper who took the place of Stanley Hall, unable to play because of an injured shoulder. It was Stock who scored the other goal.
